STOP AND SMELL THE ROSES

Everyone loves giving and receiving gifts. A gift can be very symbolic of our feelings as well as revealing of our personality. Exchanging a gift, allows us to strengthen a bond with another person as well as disclosing our sentiment towards one another. A gift can signify more than what it is, by communicating a message without the use of words, much the same as our Sacraments in the church. Look at the significance of roses, red roses represent romantic or passionate love, white roses mean purity or innocence, and yellow roses are usually for friendship. Gifts can convey an overwhelming emotional response to both the recipient as well as the gift giver. It is said that there are three parts to a gift, first being the intent, which offers guidance in what to give. Second would be the delivery... many times gifts are given in response to date, anniversary, or event. The third part would be the acceptance of the gift... I know personally my satisfaction is seeing the response in receiving a gift... especially the simplest gift.

Gifts need to be given voluntarily and without any compensation. I have heard the expression, that once a gift is given, it is no longer ours to worry about. Therefore, we should not expect anything in return for our kindness or charity. This is a good practice and removes all burdens of any reciprocation, or lack of, instead gifts help us build trust, a sense of safety, and most important a connection with someone else.

In today's reading, we have three "Wise Men" that were prudent, intelligent, and sensible. When I think of this story I reflect on how intuitive and determined they must have been to seek out this newborn child; how far they travelled; and the significance of the gifts they chose to bring. It is quite noteworthy to acknowledge that they made an amazing declaration for all of humanity (once again without words) in acknowledging who this child was. These gifts were significant to the Wise Men as well as to their culture. But even more important, it led to an understanding and recognition as to the ministry and purpose in this newborn's life. It is a common practice and long observed tradition to bring gifts when visiting someone for the first time. But the gifts the Wise Men brought were even more significant since they represented gifts of esteem and distinction reserved for a King.

Gold, a gift to honor royalty and symbolic of love, having value in all cultures it is associated with things refined and pure, therefore this gift is an acknowledgement of Jesus as a King. Seeing Him as someone who will reign over a nation – a realm which Jesus was to fulfill. This was a gift to show respect for royal stature and power that this child was to have in society.

Frankincense, just as it sounds, it is a sweet-smelling aromatic incense or perfume used to burn in the temples for religious and spiritual rituals. The gift of frankincense concedes to the divinity of Christ. It is symbolic of prayer as it burns and the smoke rises. A very visual aspect representing our prayers rising to the heavens in a spiritual movement within the air.

The gift of Myrrh, an aromatic resin or oil, represents sacred consecration or anointment. Amazing enough, during the time of the birth of Jesus, myrrh had greater value than gold. It was used for ceremonial as well as practical uses, but in comparison today, we also use aromatic oils in our Sacraments. Oils are symbolic of consecration during rituals as well as when you are about to die. Myrrh's association to oil and an anointing points to the foreshadowing of Christ's death.

What we hear, see, and experience through our faith is not by accident, but with our humanity in mind. We are a "being" with senses that are alive and intended to experience in our faith. The Catholic faith is so rich in its symbolism and use of our senses, it is no wonder that we are so drawn to experience and practice our traditions and rituals over and over again. Which can bring much comfort and peace to so many of our faithful. Also, keep in mind, that God has already revealed everything that is necessary for us to know, but we have yet to grasp what it means. Therefore, I suggest to "stop and smell the roses"... no matter what color they are, but remember to open your senses, mind, and heart to the incredible message you might encounter.

WHO IS SANTO NINO?

The following information attributed to Culturertrip.com, an online magazine Valerie Caulin, 15 November 2017.

A dominantly Catholic country, The Philippines has at least 76 million baptized Catholics. With almost 500 years of presence, the Catholic Church in the Philippines directly links to the country's history. Will it come as a surprise that the stronghold of Catholicism in the country was brought about by an adorable curly-haired statue of the child Jesus?

When Magellan died and the remaining crew returned to Spain, the natives returned to their old beliefs and made the image into a pagan idol. Under Miguel Lopez de Legazpi, the Spaniards successfully colonized the Philippines in 1565. While raiding the villages, they saw the image again underneath the fires. Legazpi ordered that a shrine be built for the Santo Niño.

The oldest religious icon in the Philippines

The Santo Niño is as old as the Catholic faith in the country. Made by Flemish artisans, the statue, now known as the Santo Niño de Cebu, is enshrined in a chapel

within Basilica Minore del Santo Niño de Cebu, or simply Santo Niño Basilica. The statue may be a diminutive figure, but it stands regal with its left hand holding a crossbearing orb (a symbol of Christian authority), while its other hand is in a priestly blessing gesture. It has a red cape with intricate embroidery and on top of its head is a crown.

Venerating the child Jesus was widespread in Spain during Magellan's time with European wood sculptors having the child god as their subject in the 1300s. Thus, it's not surprising that they gave it as a gift during the baptism rites of Rajah Humabon. (A similar Infant Jesus icon is the Holy Child of Prague.)

The original statue brought by Magellan is still found in Cebu. Devotees can see it encased in bullet-proof glass. Santo Niño is highly revered in Cebu and in other places in the country and its popularity resulted in other versions of a Holy Child dressed in ways people can relate to, from a policeman to a wandering child.

Santo Nino de Cebu

The image reminds us of Jesus being the King, not an earthly king but a divine King, since he is both man and God. The Crown symbolizes Jesus as King of the Universe. The Orb reminds people of the sovereignty of the Lord who rules a Kingdom that has no end. The Cross symbolizes the arrival of Christianity in the country. The Scepter symbolizes the great authority of Jesus throughout the world. The White Robes represent purity, holiness, and Jesus' resurrection. The Red Cape represents the death, passion, and martyrdom of Jesus Christ.

From Cebu, Santo Niño is venerated all over the country with festivals celebrated every third Sunday of January. Cebu holds the annual Sinulog festival, the Philippines' main religious festival in the child god's

honor, attracting millions of devotees and tourists annually for decades. Other festivals celebrated during the feast of the Holy Child are Kalibo's Ati-Atihan and Iloilo's Dinagyang.




PARISH REGISTRATION
