FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT YEAR A | MARCH 19, 2023

I wonder if some of my issues with God have to do with the reality that he does, in fact, play favorites. I am tempted to read the idea of God's favor in the sense of my Western, specifically North American understanding of fairness. The elder sons of Jesse probably felt that they had demonstrated the necessary leadership skills and charisma to avoid the harsh words spoken to the prophet Samuel: "...I have rejected him." As an elder son myself, I cringe at the thought of God's rejection. Why would a shepherd boy, a position that was so marginal in ancient society that they were literally homeless, be the one to deserve anointing? And then we hear the profound biblical image passed down from God's People Israel: The Lord IS a shepherd. God positions his strength in hands that normally care for sheep, in a body which normally spends terrifying nights fighting wolves, and in a heart that, as we know from the familiar tragedy of David's reign, is subject to the deep temptations that power brings to all rulers. If God is a shepherd, that means I am a sheep, and I'm not quite as clever or deserving as I thought I was. Then again, do I even want the burden of kingship? It is an image of care and profound meaning wrapped up in a political reality that doesn't even come close to what I would consider "fair."

In fulfilling the unresolved promise of God's favor on his people, Jesus points also to the thorny question of the deserving and undeserving. He does not treat the situation at the Pool of Siloam like the modern philosophers who tease out puzzles of deserving. Although Kant and Leibnitz would probably agree with the common sense of the people in this scene (that bad things happen to people who deviate from an overarching moral law), Jesus directs the scene of tragedy to himself. Look at me, he demands. The horrors of this world cannot be understood by formulas of individual sin or virtue. When you look at me, you see the light that breaks this darkness. And then, as miracle shatters despair, the literal darkness of the man born blind yields in the hands of a love that does not ask the question of deserving. It is the same love that calls the sinners and outcasts of Galilee into "...as miracle shatters despair, the literal darkness of the man born blind yields in the hands of a love that does not ask the question of deserving."

fellowship; the love that deeply disturbs the various factions of Jesus' time. It is a love which should also disturb our sense of fairness and deserving.

Speaking of Jesus' time, we are careful to remember that the Greek of John's Gospel did not allow us to read the particularities and nuances of these factions. We only read "the Pharisees" and "the Jews," when we should understand that both of these terms covered categories that would include Jesus and his followers. To relieve the potential antisemitism that lurks in my use of the words "Pharisee" and "Pharisaical," I am grateful to a few Jewish friends who point out that the dialogue in the long second part of this Gospel reading is a good depiction of respectful and culturally normative discourse around Jewish law among teachers. This is important to remember because we can be tempted to read our own projections of fairness or deserving into such interactions.

It was after all the disciples of Jesus that made the assumption that someone sinned to merit the blindness of the man by the Pool. As his disciples today, may we offer our questions and concerns to God in the humility that our own prejudices and assumptions may be revealed, and then broken. On this Lenten journey, may we yield to God's grace in a new way.
