

Readings: Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Col 3:1-4; Jn 20:1-9

The Deacon's Speakin'

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Easter morning was a time of confusion. The women who had come with Jesus from Galilee only a few days earlier were now prepared to anoint His crucified dead body. But they would find instead an empty tomb and two "men". Luke described these two dressed in dazzling garments. Were they angels or men?

Despite Jesus having foretold this event, it seems to have taken the disciples by surprise. They weren't expecting a resurrection after all. It's also interesting that the women were the first to find the tomb empty — among them was Mary Magdalene. Luke is the evangelist who relates how the women from Galilee were providing for Jesus and His followers out of their resources. These women seem to be wealthy and supported Jesus and the apostles in their travels throughout Galilee — seemingly without a way to make money.

Luke also tells us that the women witnessed the crucifixion and saw where His body was laid. It shouldn't be a surprise then that it was the women who came upon the empty tomb first (rather than the apostles). Out of the confusion of Easter morning Mary Magdalene and her female companions were the first to preach the "Good News".

On this Easter morning, let us sit before the empty tomb, meditate on His words, then go out to announce the "Good News". In doing so, we will follow the example of the earliest apostles, the women followers of Jesus.

Happy Easter! Alleluia! Alleluia!

Sergio P. Negro Scholar Applications

Applications for Sergio P Negro Scholarships for the 2022 - 2023 academic year are now available on the St. Paul Catholic Newman Center website. The Sergio P. Negro Endowment Fund was established in honor of our founding priest, who had a deep and abiding commitment to education. The Endowment Fund anticipates awarding a minimum of two, \$2,500 scholarships to deserving students for the academic year.

To be eligible, you must be either an upper division undergraduate or a graduate student preparing to use your knowledge and skills to witness and minister to others. This is meant to inclusive of many vocations and forms of service, including education, medicine, social services, etc. A pre-condition is that you must have either been raised within or are currently affiliated and active with our St. Paul Catholic Newman Center parish beyond attending Mass. An overall GPA of 2.5 or greater is also required.

The deadline for applications to be received is Friday, May 13, 2022. They may be submitted electronically to Scholarship@csufnewman.com or mailed to St. Paul Catholic Newman Center, 1572 E. Barstow Ave., Fresno, CA 93710. In all cases, applications and accompanying documents must be typed. Final selection of awardees will be through an interview process.

Creation Care Tips

Nature knows how to bring life out of death too by composting dead organic matter. If you haven't already, start your own compost or worm bin to divert your food scraps from the landfill into valuable fertilizer for your yard or garden (or someone else's). It's easy to do, even if you only have a small space. Check out a book at the library, search for "how to compost" online, or ask at your local nursery to learn how. If you already have a bin going, offer to help someone else get one going too.

Fibrodysplasia Ossificans Progressiva (FOP)

Extra-skeletal bone formation causes progressive loss of mobility as the joints become affected. Inability to fully open the mouth may cause difficulty in speaking and eating. They may also have breathing difficulties as a result of extra bone formation around the rib cage that restricts expansion of the lungs.

There are not many cases of FOP in the world; yet, one of our parishioners has it. Her name is Charis and she is a wonderful example of how to find (and give) joy and hope even in the midst of illness. She has supported our Youth Group, Campus Ministry, Sisters of Notre Dame and our parish both in kind and in prayer and the joy of her heart exudes her words and actions. Too Good to Be True

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Acts 10:34a, 37-43 Peter's discourse
- ► Colossians 3:1-4 Mystical death and resurrection
- ▶ John 20:1-9 Peter and the disciple at the tomb

This Easter reading from the Gospel of John is one of the most puzzling resurrection stories we have in Scripture. Then again, in all of the resurrection stories, we get the sense that the disciples were much more confused than we are to hear that Jesus was raised from the dead. We have the benefit of knowing the "end of the story" before they did. Although several times Jesus is said to have told his followers that he would be killed and then raised from the dead, the Gospel writers also told us that the apostles

didn't understand what Jesus was saying. How could they have?

Mary Magdalene is a central figure in this resurrection story, as she is in all of the other Gospels. We are told she stayed with Jesus throughout his torture until he died, and all four Gospels tell us she was right there three days later when the empty tomb is discovered. Peter and a mysterious unnamed "other disciple" are a part of this story too as they discover Jesus' body is missing. They seem to realize that his corpse wasn't stolen (if it were, the burial garments surely would have gone with it). The unnamed disciple "saw and believed" but we

aren't told what he believed. The passage ends suggesting the trio still doesn't understand what has happened. The seven verses that follow this


passage tell us that Jesus




appeared to Mary Magdalen and she comes to believe he is alive again.
