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Fifth Sunday of Lent, Year C April 3, 2022 Readings: Ez 37:12-14; Rom 8:8-11; Jn 11:1-45

You better watch out You better not cry H You better not pout I'm telling you why W Santa Claus is comin' to town

He's making a list He's checking it twice He's gonna find out Who's naughty or nice

So many people, Catholics included, think of God as a judge, watching to punish us when we do bad and reward us for good deeds. After all, how do we get to heaven - by avoiding bad and doing good. But that is that is Santa Claus, not God!

We are currently in Cycle C of the scripture readings at Sunday Mass. The Church has set aside the last three weeks in Cycle C to focus on the God Jesus revealed – a loving, forgiving, reconciling God. All the readings for these three Sundays support the notion of a forgiving and reconciling God. In the Gospel readings in particular, Jesus clearly shows us that merciFUL God with the Prodigal Son last week and the woman caught in adultery this week. As Edgar, our Campus Ministry Director, said in his talk to RCIA, "There is not a single thing we can do to make God love us more and not a single thing we can do to make God love us more and not a single thing we can do to make God love us more and not a single thing we can do to this perspective of God when he points out that "while we were still sinners. Christ died for us" (Rm 5:8). He did not wait for us to become good first.

It seems easier to convince people of a God who rewards good and punishes bad than the unconditionally loving and forgiving God that Jesus reveals. Jesus certainly struggled to get people to accept this loving God perhaps because it raises questions like "You mean it doesn't matter if I am good or bad?" or "But isn't it unfair if I work hard at being good but then bad people also get to go to heaven?" Jesus' answer, especially in the Gospel of John, is "Get over it. I come from God and I am telling you this is how God is."

There is one caveat though - if it is even a caveat - now go and be as forgiving as God. That's the rub. To become as gentle, loving and merciful as God, we first need to experience God's forgiveness. Having a real experience of God's forgiveness opens us to become merciful like God. But then we don't get to that experience until we acknowledge our sin or sinfulness. Jesus reminds us "Those who are well do not need a physician but sick do. Go and learn the meaning of the words I desire mercy not sacrifice. I did not come to call the righteous but sinners." (Mt 9; 12-13). Catholics have no problems saying they are sinners but the minute you point out an actual sin, their backs go up and Freud's defense mechanism kick into action.

Christ expressly came for sinners, actual ones who healthily probe their dark side and seek redemption. A great place to start is at our reconciliation service on April 5 at 6:00pm. The service will give us time to reflect and then go to confession to experience God's forgiveness and begin our journey to being forgiven and forgiving.

Creation Care Tips

"Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." — Isaiah 43:18-19 If you sometimes feel overwhelmed by the direction the climate crisis is going, consider reading chapter 43 from Isaiah as an antidote. Or read chapter 3 of Pope Francis' Laudato Si' (you can find it online for free). He reminds us, "The Spirit of God has filled the universe with possibilities and therefore, from the very heart of things, something new can always emerge" (#80).

Weekly Justice Challenge

Justice Challenge: What is the role of anger and rage in our lives? What purpose does it serve? We often think that when we feel anger, we need to express it... we need to get it out of our system. Perhaps anger has a different purpose as Jesus suggests to the angry crowd that is about to hurl stones at the guilty woman. Perhaps anger is a signal that there is something wrong inside of us, some pain that has surfaced because we have witnessed an injustice in the world and our consciences are feeling pricked. Anger can trick us into thinking that the injustice is outside of us or that we are above it. But Jesus suggests that when we seek justice with anger, rage, or revenge, we should use our anger to look within and hurl stones at our own sin. The challenge this week is to address the injustice that has root in our own souls.

Death Is Not Final

This Week's Readings at Mass

- Ezekiel 37:12-14 Promise of resurrection
- Romans 8:8-11 The flesh and the Spirit
- ▶ John 11:1-45 The raising of Lazarus

The story of the raising of Lazarus is a story we could come back to time and time again throughout our lives as we await the death of a loved one or our own death, or after we've experienced the death of a loved one. Each time, we might find more meaning or consolation in it. It is the story of a faith community (Mary, Martha, and the Jews) trying to come to terms with the seeming finality of physical death with their belief in eternal life. It is also a story of people like us who are confused, grieving, and perhaps even upset with Jesus for not being there when they needed him.

Jesus never belittles Martha or Mary for their feelings: their anger that he didn't come as soon as they called for him, their tears at their brother's death, or their incredulity when Jesus orders that the stone be removed from the front of Lazarus' tomb. He simply accepts their limited human understanding and shows them that he is the resurrection and the life. For the rest of their lives Martha, Mary, and Lazarus, probably pondered the meaning of Jesus' words, "I am the Resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." Jesus doesn't say that physical death isn't real, but that it isn't ultimate or final. In some way we can't understand with our rational minds, the believer who dies still lives

while the living who believe will not die an everlasting death.

Questions of the Week

Which character in the story do you most relate to? Why?

How have you wrestled with the death of a loved one(s) while clinging to a belief in everlasting life?

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
