THE DEACON'S SPEAKIN'

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

In the Western church, August 15 is the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary, the celebration of Mary's body as well as soul being "assumed" into heaven. In the Eastern church, today's feast is called the "Dormition" or "falling asleep" of Mary. In the Lutheran, Episcopal and many other churches, August 15 is the feast of St. Mary the Virgin.

The Gospel for August 15 is Mary's Magnificat, her song of hope and joy in the Christ child whom she will bear. The words of the Magnificat should dispel any notion we might have of Mary as a timid, shy figure. Her canticle is a prophetic, cutting-edge declaration of faith in the living, creating love of God. Her song celebrates God's saving work of the past and anticipates the saving work of the child in her womb.

The Magnificat proclaims the Gospel of the Christ: Mary is the "lowly servant" on whom God looks with favor. She mirrors the Good News her Son will proclaim: the Gospel of forgiveness, humble service to one another, justice and, ultimately, resurrection. August 15 is what some call Mary's "Easter"- the fulfillment of the promise of her Son's resurrection in her own life. That same promise will be realized in our own lives, when her loving generosity becomes our loving generosity, when her "yes" to God becomes our "yes" to God, when her song of faith and hope becomes our song.

With Mary, we are called to be disciples and witnesses of Jesus Christ. As Mary welcomes the Christ child into her life despite its many traumatic complications, we are called to welcome the Christ of compassion and peace into our homes and communities. As she journeys with her son to Jerusalem, we are called to journey with Him and take up our crosses. As she cradles the broken body of her son, we are called to hold and support and heal one another in our brokenness and pain. As she realizes the promise of her son's resurrection at the end of her days, we are called to live in the hope that the same Easter promise will be fulfilled in our lives.


Campus Ministry is kicking off the new school year this Wednesday, August 18th at 6:00pm in the Newman Hall.

Parish Registration

There are instances when, as a member of the parish, you must provide verification of membership at the Newman Center. This is necessary as it applies to the administration of Sacraments and the required record-keeping. For this reason, we ask you to please register as a member of the parish.

Verification (written) of membership in this non-territorial parish of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Fresno may be provided for any baptized Catholic who fulfills any of the following:

- registered in our parish database for a period of six months or more
- reference of regular parish involvement by a member of the parish pastoral staff
- identification as a regular member of our worshiping community (attendance at Mass on the Lord's Day) by a member of our pastoral staff

Since we, unlike other Catholic parishes, do not have a specific territorial area, designated by parish boundaries, living in the vicinity of the St. Paul Catholic Newman Center does not automatically mean membership in this parish. (The territorial parish area in which SPCNC is located covers portions of Saint Anthony of Padua parish and Sacred Heart parish.) Hence, personal registration, active involvement and participation in worship and other activities on a regular basis are required to receive any documenting letter (e.g. for purposes of being a Catholic sponsor/godparent) of membership in SPCNC.

Masking

Pastors, Administrators, Priest and Deacons

Effective immediately, it is <u>recommended</u> that masks now be worn during Sunday Masses, weekday Masses and any other services/events within our churches by everyone in attendance regardless of their vaccination status. Priests presiding at Mass may remove their masks at various moments during the Liturgy as they see fit. However, masks should be worn by all priests, deacons and extraordinary ministers of the Eucharistic when they are distributing Holy Communion. Again, this is in sensitivity to and for the benefit of the health and safety of ourselves and those around us.

Following various health department guidelines and those of every Catholic School District in the State of California, all our students and teachers will be <u>mandated</u> to wear masks indoors, again, regardless of vaccination status. Guidelines for our Faith Formation programs will essentially follow what we are doing in our Catholic Schools and will be posted soon.

We all knew that re-opening and getting somewhere near 'normal' would take time and would be like taking two steps forward and one step back. Rejoice in the 'forward' steps and be patient with the 'backward' steps. God bless you all!

Mary: Not Meek or Mild


This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Revelation 11:19a; 12:1-6a; 10ab The woman and the dragon
- ▶ 1 Corinthians 15:20-27 Christ the first fruits
- ► Luke 1:39-56 Mary Visits Elizabeth; the Magnificat

To interpret Mary as passive and meek is to limit what we know about her. Understanding Mary's world helps us to understand the radical courage of her "yes" to bearing Jesus in a society where she could have been stoned to death for being pregnant before marriage. Historically, scholars agree that she was an illiterate, Jewish, peasant girl, probably married about the age of 13 and living in the town of Nazareth with a population of about 1,600 people. She and Joseph lived in an occupied state under the brutal King Herod. They owed triple taxes: to Rome, to Herod, and the Temple. Like many women in the developing world today, she probably spent up to ten hours a day gathering firewood, hauling water, cooking, and cleaning for her extended family. She suffered poverty and oppression, and ultimately, the execution of her son.

There is a strong, prophetic nature to the song Mary proclaimed when she visited her relative Elizabeth after she said "yes" to bearing Jesus. This passage is

called the Magnificat (Lk 1:46-55). Like the great prophets in the Old Testament, Mary proclaims that God is a God of reversals who will lift up the lowly, fill the hungry with good things, scatter the proud, and bring the powerful down from their thrones. These are not the words of a meek and mild woman, but the words of a direct and courageous prophet.



"Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."

Sheepish Question:

How can I better follow Mary's example in speaking—and listening—to God?

With a mother like that, it's no wonder that Jesus arrived at adulthood and immediately proclaimed that he had come to let the oppressed go free, release the captives, and bring good news to the poor. Pope Francis has said: "I've said it, but I repeat it. Our Lady, Mary, was more important than the Apostles, than bishops, deacons, and priests" (July 28, 2013). Today, on the feast of Mary's assumption into heaven,


we celebrate this woman of profound strength and courage whose faithfulness allowed our God to become human.


