A Christmas Prayer Christmas Day 2021

On this morning, we pray to Joseph, an anxious father who, just the evening before, had to tell his beloved wife, Mary, that the best he could do was to bed her down in an animal shed, and hope that it would be warm enough and comfortable enough as she labored to give birth to their child.

St. Joseph, help us to appreciate that our plans will not always work, and we must adjust to make do, trusting that God will be with us.

On this morning we pray to Mary, Mother of Jesus, a woman exhausted from the pain of childbirth, but joyous that her newborn son was resting peacefully even if it was a simple bed of straw, wrapped in whatever material was available. You endured a long night but somehow knew that this tiny miracle, composed of the essence of the universe, would change the course of history.

Blessed Virgin, be with us as we endure our own trials. Help us to realize that the dawn will come, all will be well, trusting that God will be with us.

On this morning, we pray to an infant Jesus just hours old, born of the earth and on the earth, waiting for the first light to illuminate the face of his mother and father, blissfully unaware of what has just happened, and what his future holds: love and laughter, friends and family, power and humility trust and betrayal, life, death and, yes, resurrection.

Dear Jesus, enlighten us creatures of the universe, so we may hear the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor, that we may love deeply, laugh heartily, and be moved by suffering. Teach us to exercise power wisely, face life fully and death with dignity trusting that you, our beginning and our end, are always with us.

Creation Care Tips

"And this shall be a sign for you; you shall find a child wrapped in swaddling clothes, and lying in a manger." -Luke 2:12 Our sacred scripture story tells us that the newborn Jesus was wrapped in swaddling clothes (the only thing Mary and Joseph had on hand), not a perfect blanket sewn with love. One of our Christmas traditions is to offer beautifully wrapped presents to friends and family. Unfortunately, this tradition involves cutting down tens of thousands of trees to make wrapping paper, most of which can't be recycled and gets discarded soon afterwards. This year, why not find alternatives for wrapping our presents, such as newspaper, old posters, or other reused paper? Some people use cloth napkins, which can be reused; others prefer using gift bags which can also be conveniently reused later on. When wrapping your gifts this year, be creative to prevent depleting our forests.

Just Like a Normal Family

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ▶ 1 Samuel 1:20-22, 24-28 Samuel's birth
- ▶ 1 John 3:1-2,21-24 We are children of God
- ► Luke 2:41-52 The boy Jesus in the Temple

With the story of Jesus' birth still fresh in our minds on this first Sunday after Christmas, the church uses the opportunity to celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family with all of the readings focused on families. It is fitting that the Gospel reading gives us a glimpse into the less-than-perfect nuclear family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. It offers a good reminder that even though they are holy, that doesn't mean their family life was idyllic all the time.

As Catholics, we believe that Mary was conceived without sin (the Immaculate Conception) and that Jesus was sinless. Joseph was a regular guy like the rest of us. Still, living in a family is hard at times, whether your family is 2/3 sinless or not. When

people live in close quarters, and there is stress about food, housing, travel, childcare, and extended family ("who was supposed to be watching Jesus, anyway?"), it's normal for frustration and impatience to flare. Factor in a budding teenager who is pushing for greater independence and parents who don't fully understand their son and you have a story like we hear today.

Mary and Joseph's feelings of anxiety and guilt at the end of their journey and their frustration with Jesus after they found him weren't sinful. Neither was Jesus' exasperated response, which he very

well may have delivered with an eye-roll: "Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" After all, Jesus was fully human, and he had to go through the same process of growing up as any child does. He wasn't born knowing how to walk or talk. His parents had to teach him his manners and ask him to help with chores. Just like he would have experienced the "terrible twos," he had to go through puberty with all it's complexities and identity conflicts. It's no wonder, then, that at the end of a long family trip with a 12-year-old, the "holy family" had a "regular family" moment.

Questions of the Week

What stands out for you most in this Gospel passage? Why?

As Christians, we believe that Jesus was both fully human and fully divine. Does this story of the 12-year-old Jesus emphasize his humanity or divinity more for you? Which do you tend to relate to more when you think of him and pray to him?

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
