THE DEACON'S SPEAKIN'

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Far too many of us love to apply the Scriptures to everyone else but ourselves. We hear a homily and think, "I sure wish so and so had heard it. He really needs it." We read some convicting verse in scripture or a book and decide to send it in a letter to a friend who "needs to hear it".

What are we doing? We're becoming "eye-inspectors" looking for wooden beams in other people's eyes when we have a whole "lumber yard" in our own! We need to become "I" inspectors. Inspect yourself first. Look into your own life. Search your own heart. Apply the scriptures to yourself!

And it's not just the failures of others. It's also the insignificant concerns we focus on instead of the glaring sins in our life. How sad it is that we get so worked up about sports and the weather and our physical ailments, yet ignore the glaring deficiencies in our own souls. The things in life we get upset about are trivialities compared to our intense spiritual needs.

Don't overlook your own failures by focusing on the failure of others. This week's gospel has a lot of one-liners, but if you take each on its own terms, there's a larger picture that shows us we can't focus on others before we focus on bringing the best out of ourselves. You can't guide a blind person until you, yourself, can see. You can't point out someone else's faults until you have identified your own shortcomings. And you can't give people the good fruit of your own labor if you haven't made any good fruit.

Last week's gospel was about how we treat others and this weeks is about how we treat ourselves. Jesus is inviting us to be honest and assess ourselves with a critical eye.

Creation Care Tips

"No good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit; for each tree is known by its own fruit. Figs are not gathered from thorns, nor are grapes picked from a bramble bush."-Luke 6:43-44 Here is an ecological proof: we know a tree by its fruits. But we must acknowledge the fact that many of this generation would not be able to tell a pear tree from a cherry tree, peach tree, or plum tree, not to mention bushes like the raspberry, blueberry, and blackberry. Consider planting a fruit tree or bush in your yard to provide an unforgettable learning experience for children, as well as a harvest to feed the family. Think about the pies you will be able to enjoy. Think about making jam to preserve the harvest. You will be living in a delectable garden! Check with a local nursery, a neighbor who is a gardener, or the Master Gardeners at your local extension agency for suggestions on the best varieties to grow in your area.

Weekly Justice Challenge

Justice Challenge: Sunday's Gospel has Jesus challenging us about critiquing the speck in our brother's eye when we have a wooden beam in our own. This speaks to Jesus' sense of humor, but also to his passion for seeing everyone as created in God's image. As Pope Francis would say, "Who are we to judge?" Your challenge this week is to think of a person or a group of people whom you have judged. Spend some time in prayer and reflection, recalling that they are children of God and looking for signs of goodness that you may not have seen before. Then pray for them sincerely and honestly, asking God to bless them and help them to grow deeper in their love for him.

Judge It By Its Fruit

This Week's Readings at Mass

- Sirach 27:5-8 All tested by their speech
- ▶ 1 Corinthians 15:54-58 Glorification of the body
- ► Luke 6:39-45 All known by their works

As is often the case, the first reading and the Gospel reading are connected in theme. The first encourages us to judge people by their words, not their physical appearance, because their speech reveals their interior life. Just as good fruit grows from a tree well-cared for, someone who cultivates a good character will speak from that place of goodness. Two centuries later, Jesus echoes the same theme, expanding on it with further examples.

Jesus' teachings today give a very concrete challenge to all his disciples down through the ages that is often hard for us to hear. Rather than point out the faults of another — "the speck in your neighbor's eye"—we are asked to notice the wooden beam in our own eye. Of course, we may want to believe that our neighbor has the beam in his eye, while we either have only a speck or maybe even think we are completely clear-sighted!

The paradox is that when we quit focusing on someone else's faults to remedy our own, we will probably no longer feel the need to stand in judgment of anyone else. Just before this passage, Jesus stated, "Stop judging and you will not be judged." That statement might seem almost impossible, but if we concentrate on taking the wooden beam out of our own eye that might naturally lead

to more compassion and understanding of others' shortcomings.

The Gospel passage ends with Jesus picking up on a

theme in the first reading from the Book of Sirach. Both remind us that we can know a tree by its fruits—good trees will produce good fruit, but rotten trees will not. Though the world may judge

people by their "appearance" (their skin color, manner of dress, sexual orientation, language, or religion), Jesus asks us to look deeper to what is in a person's heart. Ultimately, their words and their actions will reveal what is there.

Questions of the Week

In what kinds of situations do you find yourself getting caught up in focusing on the specks in other people's eyes?

What good fruits have you seen produced by someone who is genuinely a "good tree"?

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
