The Hometown Boy


This Week's Readings at Mass

This Gospel reading is a continuation of what we heard last week when Jesus read to his hometown people from the scroll of Isaiah: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor" (Lk. 4:18-19). At first, the crowd is amazed at his words and responds positively to him. Then they start questioning where this simple hometown boy got his authority and confidence from because they knew his father was "just" a simple carpenter with no particular reputation, power, or prestige.

Imagine if one day you entered your little country church in middle America to find an unremarkable local farm boy who had gone away (but not to college or the seminary), had returned, and was on the altar preaching and teaching with great authority. Then imagine him announcing that the Spirit of the Lord rested upon him and chose him to bring good news to the poor, proclaim freedom to the oppressed and those held captive, and give sight to the blind. That was the sense of astonishment Jesus was getting upon his return to his hometown.



"They will fight against you but not prevail... for I am with you to deliver you."

Sheepish Question:

How can I be more courageous in defending what is loving and good?

Jesus knows he is now being misjudged by his history instead of his words and actions. He goes on to point out that the prophets in the past were judged the same way, and that infuriates the crowd because now he is claiming to be a prophet too. The next thing we know, the previously receptive crowd becomes an angry mob who wants to shut him up by killing him. This time he manages to escape, but he won't in the future.

Questions of the Week

Who can you think of who is/was a prophet who spoke the truth but wasn't always well received and perhaps was even attacked or killed in the end?
