The Deacon's Speakin'

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I just finished reading the recent encyclical letter of Pope Francis entitled "Fratelli Tutti". It was inspired, Pope Francis states, by Saint Francis of Assisi. The letter is devoted to fraternity, social friendship, and the love we should extend to all people. Pope Francis writes, "I have sought to make this reflection an invitation to dialogue among all people of good will."

The Holy Father chose the parable of the Good Samaritan to encourage his readers to take his message "to heart". This call to love appears throughout all of the New Testament, but nowhere is it more evident than the story of the man who is assaulted by thieves and left badly injured on the side of the road. We all know the "rest of the story".

The Pope states, "Today we have a great opportunity to express our innate sense of fraternity, to be Good Samaritans who hear the pain of other people's trouble rather than fomenting greater hatred and resentment. . . Let us seek out others and embrace the world as it is, without fear of pain or a sense of inadequacy, because there we will discover all the goodness that God has planted in human hearts. Difficulties that seem overwhelming are opportunities for growth, not excuses for a glum resignation that can lead only to acquiescence. Yet let us not do this alone, as individuals. The Samaritan discovered an innkeeper who would care for the man; we too are called to unite as a family that is stronger than the sum of small individual members. For 'the whole is greater than the part, but it is also greater than the sum of its parts'. Let us renounce the pettiness and resentment of useless in-fighting and constant confrontation. Let us stop feeling sorry for ourselves and acknowledge our crimes, our apathy, our lies. Reparation and reconciliation will give us new life and set us all free from fear.

The Samaritan who stopped along the way departed without expecting any recognition or gratitude. His effort to assist another person gave him great satisfaction in life and before his God, and thus became a duty. All of us have a responsibility for the wounded, those of our own people and all the peoples of the earth. Let us care for the needs of every man and woman, young and old, with the same fraternal spirit of care and closeness that marked the Good Samaritan."

I'm hoping that this little excerpt from "Fratelli Tutti" will inspire you to read this wonderful letter and its message of love.

They Liked Listening to Him!

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Deuteronomy 18:15-20 A prophet like Moses
- ▶ 1 Corinthians 7:32-35 The state of virginity
- Mark 1:21-28 Cure of a demoniac

It's easy to be impressed by all the miracles Jesus worked: he healed the sick, raised the dead, gave sight to the blind, and fed thousands starting with only a small amount of bread. What we might not always catch from hearing the gospels is what an amazing speaker and teacher Jesus was.

We've probably all had a mix of good, average, and bad teachers in our day. The bad ones might have bored us as they taught something that didn't seem very relevant. Maybe they didn't seem interested in us as individuals. Maybe they were rigid in the classroom. Perhaps they talked like know-it-alls and didn't have patience with students who "didn't get it" or didn't follow their directions exactly.

Then there are the great teachers. They are excited about what they are teaching, and they get the students excited about it too. They care about their students as individuals. They offer support and encouragement, but also expect a lot from their students, who usually rise to the occasion. Great teachers win





In this reading Mark gives us a glimpse of what people thought of Jesus as a teacher. For someone who didn't have all the fancy education that the scribes and Pharisees had, Jesus amazed and astonished the crowd with his words. The gospel doesn't tell us exactly what Jesus taught that day, but whatever it was thrilled and excited his listeners. They recognized him as having authority beyond the religious leaders who usually preached during their synagogue services. On top of that, Jesus matched his teaching with his actions when he healed the man with an unclean spirit. No wonder his fame spread throughout the whole region. People recognize a great teacher and leader when they see one.

Questions of the Week

Talk about great teachers you've had in your life. What made them so good? Can you imagine Jesus having these same qualities as a teacher?

What do you think the difference was between Jesus teaching "as one having authority" and the teachings the people were used to by the scribes?
