THE DEACON'S SPEAKIN'

Dear Newman Center Family,

Little did I know what was in store for me when I was ordained nineteen plus years ago. I envisioned myself serving and working with the community family whom I had known since my college years. I tried to follow the example of my mentor, Fr. Sergio Negro and "The Plan" that I had in mind worked well for the first five years under the guidance of our pastor, Fr. Perry Kavookjian. I did my "deacon thing", as Perry liked to call it, and I knew that I had made the right decision in saying "yes" to my call to ministry in the Church.

My "plan" took an unexpected turn in April of 2008 when Fr. Perry was assigned to "grow" a new parish in Bakersfield. The next six months were filled with turmoil, both here at the Newman Center and in our world where the Great Recession hit us and led to financial crises. We found ourselves without a pastor in November and Bishop John Steinbock asked if I would be willing to be the first Parish Life Coordinator in the Diocese of Fresno for a two-year assignment. Those two years quickly turned into 14. The Bishop also asked Fr. Dave Norris to serve as our Parish Priest. Fr. Dave was truly a blessing for me and our community. He served here for his "second tour of duty" until his retirement in September of 2018. This necessitated having to find a priest to serve our community. Thanks to God that the Claretian Order stepped up and sent us Fr. Paul Keller followed by Fr. Byron Macias.

So here I am almost 14 years after my conversation with Bishop Steinbock, getting ready to transition to a "new" position as just plain ole "Deak" or "Deacon John" (whichever you choose) – no other titles. I mention all this history because it tells the tales of most of our lives. One transition leads to another which leads to another, etc. Change is the constant for all of us. However, with these changes have come the most enjoyable aspect of all of this. YOU – You who have grown up with me for almost 60 years – you who joined us along the way – and you who have hung in there with your love and support. You have made the past years so rewarding and joyful. Thank you, thank you, thank you!

Can you name a high school teacher that has left a lasting impression on you?

Ok...

I’m just going to be honest with you my friends...OK? I don’t regularly attend Mass (but I think about it). My high school friends do. Robert, Eve, Frank and his wife Deborah and Conrad are regulars. Last year around this time I decided to go to church in San Diego. I enjoyed it. There wasn’t a national Covid emergency declared yet... but we knew things weren’t right. When the priest said to offer each other a sign of peace I looked and reached out to the man behind me and he just made eye contact, gave me a warm smile, placed his hands over his heart and nodded to me. I returned the gesture. I felt good...the next day I learned that all the churches around the world were closed.

He turned and pointed at me and gave me the biggest smile with his eyes. I had a mask on so he wasn’t sure.

“Greg...” was all I said.

“I’m so glad to see you but I have to go find the priest...it’s good to see you.”

He disappeared and came back in the procession leading to the altar. You see John is now a deacon at the church. His voice was warm, eloquent and welcoming as he spoke to the congregation. My friends were all there, but things had changed. They all sat in different parts of the church.

As I sat in the back corner alone, listening to him speak of resurrection and resurrecting our own lives during these trying times a wonderful calm came over me. I hardly see him but when I do it’s trancelike, the control he has over me. I shed a tear or two...

I will remember this sermon as I do the lectures he gave in high school. The same voice that I loved in high school. He was also my football coach. I had him for English my sophomore year and on game day I didn’t do my homework. He looked at me in disappointment and said, “Mr. Gonzales...no homework, you don’t suit up.” I wasn’t as disappointed in not suiting up as I was seeing the disappointment in his eyes before he turned away. I never missed another assignment and signed up for his classes whenever I could. I still remember that moment as a turning point in my life. He taught me accountability and responsibility with one look. I’m so thankful for him and his message from God, my family and my friends...have I said this before? It never gets old...

Frank sent me a notice of his retirement in July of 2022. I wish you nothing but the best in your upcoming retirement. To my grandchildren for whom I write this book. Elle, Harvey, Ava and Harris...and whomever comes next...you are just starting out on your journey of learning. Teachers can make a big difference in your lives. Just like your Aunt Jenny, your aunt Anna and your Aunt Kara (who are also your moms); all who are teachers in their own right.

Love your teachers.

This man taught me over fifty years ago...


Where Do We Stand?

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ▶ Deuteronomy 30:10-14 - God's command clear
- ▶ Colossians 1:15-20 - Christ's fullness and reconciliation
- ▶ Luke 10:25-37 - The good Samaritan

Christianity has a long-standing tradition of teaching "natural law," the belief that all people can understand and agree with objective, universal moral teachings, regardless of their religion or education because they flow from nature. Because we all have a conscience, we can discern what is objectively good and what is objectively evil. Accordingly, anyone who hears Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan should recognize that it is the Samaritan, not the priest or the Levite, who does the right thing when he comes upon the victim who was beaten and robbed.

The lawyer who was testing Jesus in the finer points of the law knew it was the Samaritan who acted as a neighbor, but he had trouble swallowing this fact because the Jews despised Samaritans. The irony is that the Good Samaritan wasn't Jewish and didn't live according to the 613 Jewish laws. What is even more ironic is that the priest and the Levite who passed by the victim were following the letter of the law which said they shouldn't touch a person who is bleeding, lest they become defiled themselves. If they were defiled they would not be allowed to minister in the

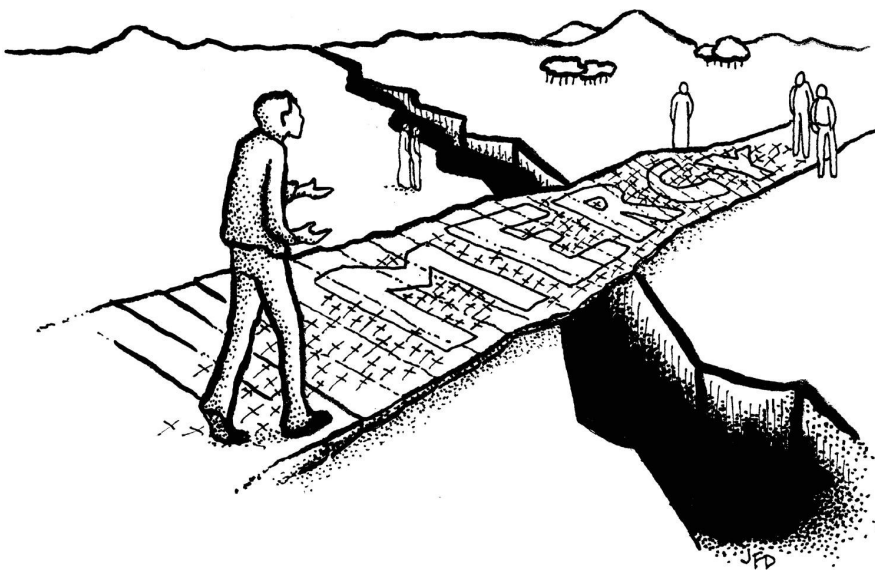
Temple or function in the community without first going through a detailed process of purification.

What this passage comes down to is the question: Where do we fall? Do we fall on the side of the lawyer, the priest, and the Levite who know and keep the letter of the law, or do we fall on the side of the Good Samaritan who responds spontaneously out of compassion because it is the right thing to do?
