THE DEACON'S SPEAKIN'

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Jesus must have been frustrated when His disciples missed the point of His mission and ministry. After being refused housing by Samaritans because of ethnic differences, James and John ask Jesus if they should call down fire from heaven to consume those who didn't accept them. Not surprisingly, Jesus rebukes them for this reaction. You can almost imagine Jesus looking at them and saying, "Really?"

If we're honest with ourselves, there are times when each of us would do the same thing. While we might not literally wish to have fire come down on others, there are times when we, including yours truly, respond in ways that are counter to what Jesus is teaching. When we're angry, our initial reaction might be to retaliate. If someone points out a flaw in our work, we might be quick to find fault with everyone around us. If someone needs medical care or food or clothing we might be happy to tell that person to work for those things like everyone else.

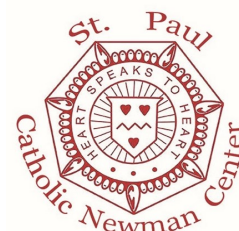
Following God's path isn't always easy. In fact, Jesus' words about not saying goodbye to family or burying one's parents might seem incredibly harsh. Jesus is simply stating, however, that we'll always be able to come up with excuses not to follow Him. Building the Kingdom of God must be our first priority. If we recognize this call, everything else will flow forth from this.

Flu Guidelines

Suggested Guidelines during the Flu / Cold Season:

- **Do Not** come to Mass if you have flu like symptoms.
- **Do Not** bring children to Mass that have flu like symptoms or are ill.
- **Do Not** receive from the Chalice or shake hands with others if you have a scratchy throat, sniffles, coughing or sneezing.
- **Do Not** touch your face or mouth without first washing your hands.
- Wash your hands good with hot water and soap before and after Mass.
- When you can't wash your hands, use a hand sanitizer with at least 62% alcohol.
- Get your flu shot, get plenty of rest, eat a balanced diet, drink water and exercise.

Use these guidelines for all events of your daily living and be well.

God's people should remember that they are excused from attending Mass if:

- A. They are ill with the flu or have reason to believe that they have flu like symptoms.
- B. Must stay home to care for a family member who is ill.
- C. They reasonably fear they will spread a flu virus.

There is an interesting dynamic in the Gospel this weekend. Jesus and the disciples enter a Samaritan village on the way and they are not welcome. A couple of disciples (James and John), want to call down fire from heaven to consume this village! I guess in their good hearts and out of love for Jesus – for they knew He was the Son of God, and seeing that the people in this village don't notice or appreciate that, they figured that they can use their powers to not only curse them but literally burn them. Yet, Jesus chooses what Pope Francis calls “the revolution of love”. And Jesus does that because He can see things that James and John didn't or couldn't. Maybe these two disciples in their zeal failed to see what Jesus saw in these villagers that didn't welcome Him.

I'm not sure about you, but I can tell how many times I fail to welcome Jesus when I choose selfishness, pride, my own ideas and ideals, the press I choose to follow and believe, act out of anger, etc. Thank God James and John weren't Jesus, otherwise I would've been fried and consumed into ashes! Care for Creation

We have just passed the summer solstice—the day with the most daylight hours in the northern hemisphere—and we will continue to enjoy long hours of sunlight for weeks to come. This is the perfect time to test out a new invention which has just hit the market. It's both ecological and economical. It replaces the dryer during the summer and is more gentle on clothing. It makes clothes smell fresh, like the outdoors. It's called lateral garment suspension...or more commonly known as “the clothesline.” In addition to the ecological aspects, hanging out your laundry is good exercise for the arms, it's relaxing, and it's an opportunity to talk to the neighbors. When it's windy, the result is better than ironing. Look for a space to stretch a laundry line—something permanent or retractable—or get a simple, fold-up drying rack to set up in the sun. You may discover you enjoy the few quiet minutes of hanging laundry outside and the fresh smell so much that you find a way to do it at other times throughout the year, not just when the summer days are at their longest.

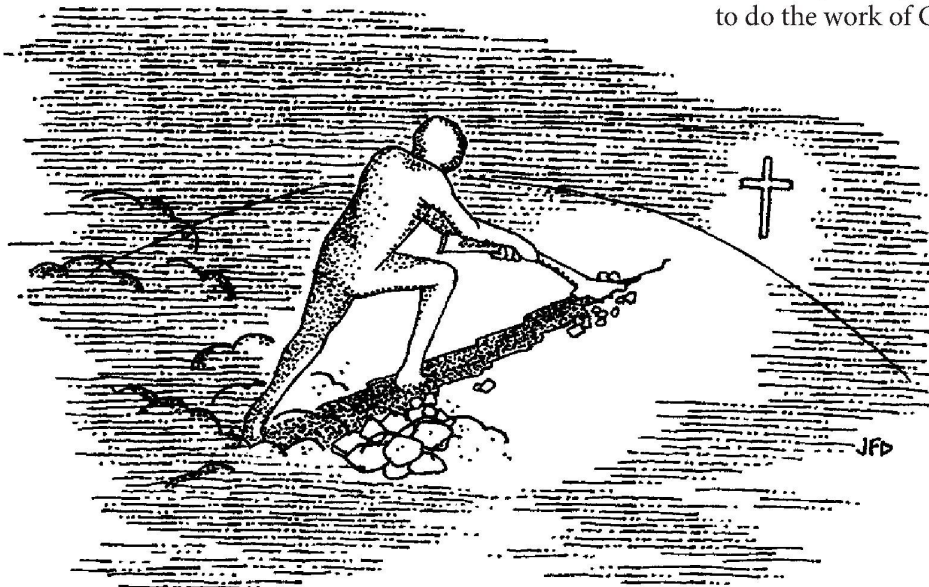
Heading Into Danger

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ▶ 1 Kings 19:16b, 19-21 - Call of Elisha
- ▶ Galatians 5:1, 13-18 - Proper use of freedom
- ▶ Luke 9:51-62 - The apostles' requirements

The Gospel reading today marks the beginning of a new section in Luke. Up until now, Jesus has been active healing and teaching in the region of Galilee, in the northern area of Palestine. Now, Luke tells us, Jesus "resolutely determined to journey to Jerusalem." Readers of his day would have recognized this phrase as a warning of what was to come because everyone knew that prophets are killed in Jerusalem. Jesus showed he was willing to go into dangerous places, and he didn't try to hide. He even sends people ahead of him to let them know he is coming. At this point, Jesus' followers were probably becoming wary and a bit anxious about where faithfulness to Jesus was going to take them.

Jesus and his group could have chosen to go around rather than through Samaria where there was long-standing ill-will between Jews and Samaritans because of a disagreement about the role of Jerusalem in worship. Samaritans didn't take fondly to Jews passing through their land, especially when they were on their way to Jerusalem, but Jesus doesn't shy away from the conflict. Jesus still offers

them a chance to accept him, but when they don't, James and John want to destroy the town because of their inhospitality. Instead of allowing his friends to react out of anger and vengeance, Jesus calmly demonstrates how to "shake the dust of your feet" and move on, as he had taught them to do earlier.

Questions of the Week

① Who do you know who is willing to go into dangerous places (literally or metaphorically) to do the work of God?

② When have you been asked to "shake the dust from your feet" and move on instead of responding with anger and judgment when you or someone you loved wasn't accepted?
