#### Pentecost Sunday, Year C June 5, 2022 Readings: Acts 2:1-11; 1 Cor 12:3b-7, 12-13; Jn 20:19-23

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

We began our Synodal Journey way back in November 2021, and since then several hundred of us have attended "Listening Sessions" facilitated by parishioners trained by the Diocese.

I was privileged to work with a very committed group in the parish who guided the discussions and took notes of what participants shared in response to the 10 questions Pope Francis had invited us to reflect on.

As requested, JoAnn LoForti and I edited and summarized our collective reports, and handed in to the Diocese 250-word capsules for each of the 10 questions. These will again be summarized as the Diocese sends to Rome its own 10-page report, reflective of the Diocesan listening sessions held in other parishes.

This does not mark an end, but barely a beginning! Many participants found the gatherings inspiring and hoped that the parish would schedule periodic "Listening Sessions" in the future.

In that spirit, there are four dates that I hope you will see as "early fruits" of our synodal journey together. In our Cafeteria, on Wednesday, June 8 at 7:00pm and Wednesday June 15 at 1:00pm, we will have a listening session around the issue of Catholic Social Teaching and Gun Violence. This was last week's front page of the Sunday Bulletin, and much more information is available on our parish website as well.

Many participants shared that "we should speak up on important issues". On June 11, at 10:00am, there will be a chance to stand in protest against Gun Violence, probably at the corner of Blackstone and Nees. Check the parish website for details as they become available.

Others also called for "greater involvement with other churches on social issues". On June 29 at 7:00pm, we will be able to do just that by attending the "Interfaith Call To Action against Gun Violence" to be held at St. James Episcopal Cathedral, 4147 East Dakota Avenue, Fresno, CA 93726. "When you send forth your spirit, they are created; and you renew the face of the ground. — Psalms 104:30 Take some deep breaths of fresh air on this day of Pentecost. This simple gesture has a great significance in our Christian tradition. Indeed, rhythmic breathing leads to deeper meditation, the grace of feeling God's presence. Sadly, one child in five suffers from asthma which can be caused or exacerbated by poor air quality in our cities, heavy pesticide use in agricultural areas, coal burning plants, and wildfires. Elderly people are also more at risk for lung trouble when the air quality is poor too. Be thoughtful when the forecast calls for smog: avoid using your car if possible to reduce emissions especially on those days when the air quality is poor.

# Parish Registration

There are instances when, as a member of the parish, you must provide verification of membership at the Newman Center. This is necessary as it applies to the administration of Sacraments and the required record- keeping. For this reason, we ask you to please register as a member of the parish.

Verification (written) of membership in this non-territorial parish of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Fresno may be provided for any baptized Catholic who fulfills any of the following:

- registered in our parish database for a period of six months or more
- reference of regular parish involvement by a member of the parish pastoral staff
- identification as a regular member of our worshiping community (attendance at Mass on the Lord's Day) by a member of our pastoral staff

Since we, unlike other Catholic parishes, do not have a specific territorial area, designated by parish boundaries, living in the vicinity of the St. Paul Catholic Newman Center does not automatically mean membership in this parish. (The territorial parish area in which SPCNC is located covers portions of Saint Anthony of Padua parish and Sacred Heart parish.) Hence, personal registration, active involvement and participation in worship and other activities on a regular basis are required to receive any documenting letter (e.g. for purposes of being a Catholic sponsor/godparent) of membership in SPCNC.

You can register at the front desk, or through our website: https://csufnewman.com/about/online-registration. <u>We also ask</u> <u>that you check in with us if you have moved, or updated</u> <u>any contact information so we can update our database.</u>

# **To Retain or Not Retain?**

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Acts 2:1-11 Descent of the Holy Spirit
- 1 Corinthians 12:3b-7, 12-13 Many gifts, one Spirit, and the analogy of the body
- ► John 20:19-23 Appearance to the disciples
- ▶ or John 14:15-16, 23b-26 The Advocate


Scripture gives us two different accounts of the coming of the Holy Spirit to read from today. One is from the author Luke in the Acts of the Apostles, which we hear in the first reading. The second is from John's Gospel. How the apostles historically received the gift of the Spirit (tongues of fire or Jesus' breath) is less important than what resulted when the Spirit filled them.

The coming of the Holy Spirit sparked a tremendous change in the lives of the disciples. Whether they received the Spirit when Jesus breathed on them (just as the first human came to life when God breathed into him) or when a great wind brought tongues of fire to them, they became the best versions of themselves. Before the coming of the Spirit, they were a fearful, closed group, hiding out, paralyzed to continue Jesus' ministry of healing and teaching. Once Jesus came to them and offered them his peace and the gift of the Holy Spirit, they immediately transformed. Rejoicing replaced fear, and the willingness to move outward to minister to others replaced

their desire for safety.

The beauty of the Spirit's working in the disciples' lives is that God didn't need them to become different people. They were still a motley crew of illiterate fisherman from an area of the country not known for anything of significance. What they learned is that regardless of their





lack of education, wealth, or social status, God could do incredible things with and through them. Jesus didn't ask them to continue his work of building the Kingdom of God by themselves. From the day of Pentecost on, they had an Advocate to teach them, strengthen them, and embolden them.
