As much as the Church would like all Christians to keep a prayerful, sober watch in anticipation of the coming of the Lord, we can't become "Advent police" just because of the urgency of vigilance. We, however, must be vigilant that our behavior and attitudes are respectful and loving to all. One way we can do this is to learn and participate in some of the Advent practices of cultures that are different from ours.

As those who help shape the unique spirit of Advent in our communities, let's help one another be attentive to God's presence all around us so that our hearts may not become drowsy form our anxieties.

Weekly Justice Challenge

Justice Challenge: This week marks the beginning of Advent. We are challenged by the Scriptures to be alert and vigilant, and to recognize that the Messiah the Jews prayed for would bring justice to our world. The first reading describes Jerusalem in the era of the Messiah as "The Lord Our Justice." Your challenge this week is to reflect on how you have helped bring more justice into the world, and to pay attention (being very vigilant) to an injustice that exists in your local community. Then decide as a household one specific step you can take to end the injustice and uphold the human rights of all.

"There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world..." —Luke 21:25-26 When we hear news these days of terrible natural disasters — floods, hurricanes, droughts, wildfires, etc.—it is easy to feel fearful and worried about the future of our world. Sometimes our fear can paralyze us. When that happens, it can help to do something, anything, to combat the changes happening in our climate. Rather than feel powerless, decide on at least one thing you can do to be a better steward of creation, whether it's eating less meat, reducing your car trips, touring a recycling plant, starting a compost bin, or anything else you can think of that reduces your environmental impact.

If You Die Tomorrow?

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Jeremiah 33:14-16 Restoration of Jerusalem
- ▶ 1 Thess. 3:12-4:2 Plea for growth in holiness
- ► Luke 21:25-28, 34-36 Coming of the son of man

Advent always begins with a Gospel reading in which Jesus tells his listeners to be on guard, alert, and watchful. In that context, Jesus was referring to his Second Coming and the end of the world as we know it. The gospel writers and Jesus' followers were certain Jesus meant this would happen in their lifetimes.

Two thousand years later, we don't usually assume that the world will end at any moment, so what are we to be vigilant and on guard for?

We may not be worried about the apocalypse happening tomorrow, but we can still take Jesus' words to heart because none of us know when we or our loved ones will die. Anyone who has ever received the news of a frightening medical diagnosis or had a friend or relative receive one will recognize how quickly it can change our perspective. Unimportant things that we spent our time on suddenly don't seem very important in light of the love we want to

give and receive before death occurs.

If our hearts are confused with distractions (read: wasting time on social media, watching Netflix, overeating or drinking, or generally spending our days doing less-than-meaningful things), Jesus wants us to reevaluate how we spend our time. There are children to read to and tuck into bed, aging parents and relatives who long for our

companionship, friends to re-connect with, grudges and past hurts to be reconciled. Hungry people need food today, homeless men and women are longing for respect and dignity, and sick and lonely people need someone to reach out to them. How would Jesus want us to spend our time if we were to die tomorrow? Let's be alert to that.

What do you want to be more vigilant about this upcoming week? How do you think Jesus is inviting you to spend your valuable time and energy?

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
