Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

September 25, 2022

Readings: Am 6:1a, 4-7; 1 Tm 6:11-16; Lk 16:19-31

In the Hebrew Scriptures, Israel is given a special charge to take care of three specific groups of people: widows, orphans, and strangers. Together, they comprise the "poor" of the Old and New Testament, whose treatment prompts reflection from the biblical prophets as well as the Apostles of Jesus. In the Hebrew Bible, each of these groups figure into the great cycles of Israel's rise and fall. They are named as privileged in this weekend's Responsorial Psalm, ripe of encouragement because their deliverance comes at the hand of God Almighty. But the Psalm also speaks a note of prophetic wisdom in line with the First Reading from the Prophet Amos, as well as the Second Reading from St. Paul. In each case, the position of these downtrodden people is a kind of litmus test for the community that surrounds them.

As Amos writes, those found complacent in the midst of the oppressed will suffer the first stings of exile. Indeed, the Northern Tribes of Israel suffered such a fate after the invasion of a foreign Assyrian army. But this also serves as a warning to we who might otherwise ask, "what does their suffering have to do with me?"

I do not consider myself among the richest of the rich, and I often excuse myself from the judgments that Prophets like Amos level against their society. At the same time, I live in the richest society in world history to date, and can't help but notice that the stream of houseless neighbors grows in my neighborhood, the heat that farmworkers endure intensifies, and many young people in my generation and the one following mine struggle to pay off debt. In other words, I am more often reminded of the hardships of this land than its blessings.

Do we also notice the downtrodden in our midst? It's not a stretch to say that they are here even in a "rich" parish like ours, we can make God's generosity known in the way we hold lightly to our blessings in the name of Christ. As St. Paul writes, we should "compete well for the faith." This is such a refreshing invitation in a world where competition usually means more suffering for more people. Instead of rugged individualism we can build solidarity. Instead of scarcity we can reveal the abundance of God's Reign. And instead of inequality, we can find ourselves truly equal in dignity and station at the Table of the Lord.

What is a Novena?

In Latin, "Novem" means "nine." A Novena is a form of prayer that normally takes place over nine days, with devotions usually focused on a specific intention. There is no prescribed form of prayer for a novena, but many include rosary prayers. Although Novenas can be prayed as a means of mourning the dead or petitioning God's help in a specific situation, we are praying a Novena of Preparation, in anticipation of St. John Henry Newman's feast day on October 9. Therefore beginning on Saturday, October 1, we'll pray a special Novena every evening at 6:00pm, led by one of our clergy or staff. Each day's prayers are focused on a particular aspect of St. John Henry Newman's spiritual guidance. We know this will be an enriching experience for our parish, and we hope to see you there!

Creation Care Tips

"There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table." —Luke 16:19-21

Two thousand years after Jesus told this parable the inequality between the rich and the poor is even more scandalous. With modern agricultural knowledge and good stewardship of natural resources, the earth can produce enough food to feed all of its population. What it can't do is feed the entire population at the level of wasteful extravagance some live today. By eating lower on the food chain and eating food that is grown more sustainably we free up resources for more people to be fed. This week, shop at a farmer's market, switch a conventional purchase to an organic one (e.g. organic milk instead of non-organic), eat a few more vegetarian meals, or choose popcorn, dried fruit, or nuts for a simple snack instead of a highly packaged and processed treat.

Weekly Justice Challenge

Justice Challenge: Sunday's Gospel tells the story of the rich man and Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31). Ironically, we don't see the rich man doing anything bad-he didn't hit Lazarus or make him leave or even yell at him. So why did he end up in eternal damnation? It was because he didn't even notice his suffering brother. The rich man was totally oblivious to the needs of Lazarus. Your challenge this week is to increase your awareness. Look at your community, your country, and even your world with new eyes. Who are the invisible poor who need your help? Discuss every evening who you have noticed for the first time. Then, at the end of the week, as a family or an individual choose one action you can do to help a person or a group whom you identified. The help could be a financial donation, direct service, or a form of advocacy on their behalf (e.g., emailing your state legislators to change laws to provide more aid to the homeless or single parent families or the mentally ill).

From Fr. Byron Macias, CMF

Jesus continues his teachings about conversion. Last week he taught us that if even a corrupt administrator can convert, so can we! This week Jesus takes the "conversion" to the next level: it's never too early!

Jesus talks about a rich man who didn't care about others (Luke 16:19-31). Then, after he dies, he realizes he spent his life so focused on himself that he missed out so much: from the poor hungry man who died at his door to his brothers who were the same or worse than he. But by then, it was too late.

I can think of at least three reasons why it's never too early to experience conversion:

First, we secure salvation in the afterlife (Jesus talks about life after death in this very Gospel passage).

Second, we can save others through our help, care and prayers. St. Francis of Assisi is the living example of this: it is in giving that we receive;

Third, indeed: it is in giving that we receive: Conversion gives meaning to our lives.

Conversion does not add anything to the power of God but it can change our lives for good. And it is not impossible to do: All it takes is to pray, to be aware, to share and to do now! It's never too early to experience conversion.

Food Recovery Network - Friday Dinners



Warnings About Extravagance

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Amos 6:1a, 4-7 Third woe
- ▶ 1 Timothy 6:11-16 The good fight of faith
- ► Luke 16:19-31 The rich man and Lazarus

This week's readings focus on extravagant wealth, poverty, and economic inequality. The passage from Amos continues the theme of last week's reading calling out the sinfulness of the extremely wealthy. They are living in luxury (beds of ivory! eating veal! drinking wine from bowls, not cups!) while around them the needy are being ignored and their country is crumbling. Presumably the poor can rarely afford meat, much less veal, and are sleeping on the ground. Jesus paints a similar picture of the disparity between the rich man Lazarus and the poor beggar at his door ending with a harsh or consoling conclusion, depending on the status of the listener/reader.

Luke's Gospel has more parables and teachings about wealth and poverty than any other, including this one about the rich man and Lazarus. Because Luke also wrote the Acts of the Apostles—which continues with many examples of money used appropriately or not—we can presume that Jesus (and the author Luke) was addressing an audience that included a mix of both wealthy and poor people. In Jesus' world, there weren't many in-between, with almost no middle class to speak of.

In reality, most of the wealth amassed by the rich

came from the exploitation of the poor, although sometimes the religious and cultural presumption was that the rich were rich because God favored them while the poor did something to lose God's favor. Jesus flatly contradicts this idea with his para-



ble. Abraham's statement, "They have Moses and the prophets. Let them listen to them" was a clear reminder to Jesus' listeners about God's desires for money and possessions to be shared and used for the benefit of everyone. "Moses and the prophets" was a catch phrase referring to the Jewish scriptures (our Old Testament). Of the 600+ commandments contained in those books, many of them detailed how wealth should be fairly distributed so that no one was left destitute. Clearly, the rich man in this parable had ignored Jewish law.
